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I am a Senior Lecturer (Associate Professor) at the Department of Economics of the University of Manchester, a Research Fellow at ICS, University of Lisbon, and a Research Affiliate at CEPR, London. I was previously Assistant Professor at the Department of Economics, Econometrics, and Finance, University of Groningen, and a Max Weber Fellow at the European University Institute. I hold an undergraduate degree from the University of Lisbon and MSc and PhD degrees from the London School of Economics.

My research interests include economic history, development and growth, macroeconomics and monetary economics, and political economy. I have published in journals such as *Journal of Economic History*, *Economic History Review*, *Financial History Review*, and *European Review of Economic History*. I have been the recipient of several international awards, including the inaugural Stiglitz Award given by the International Economic Association.
